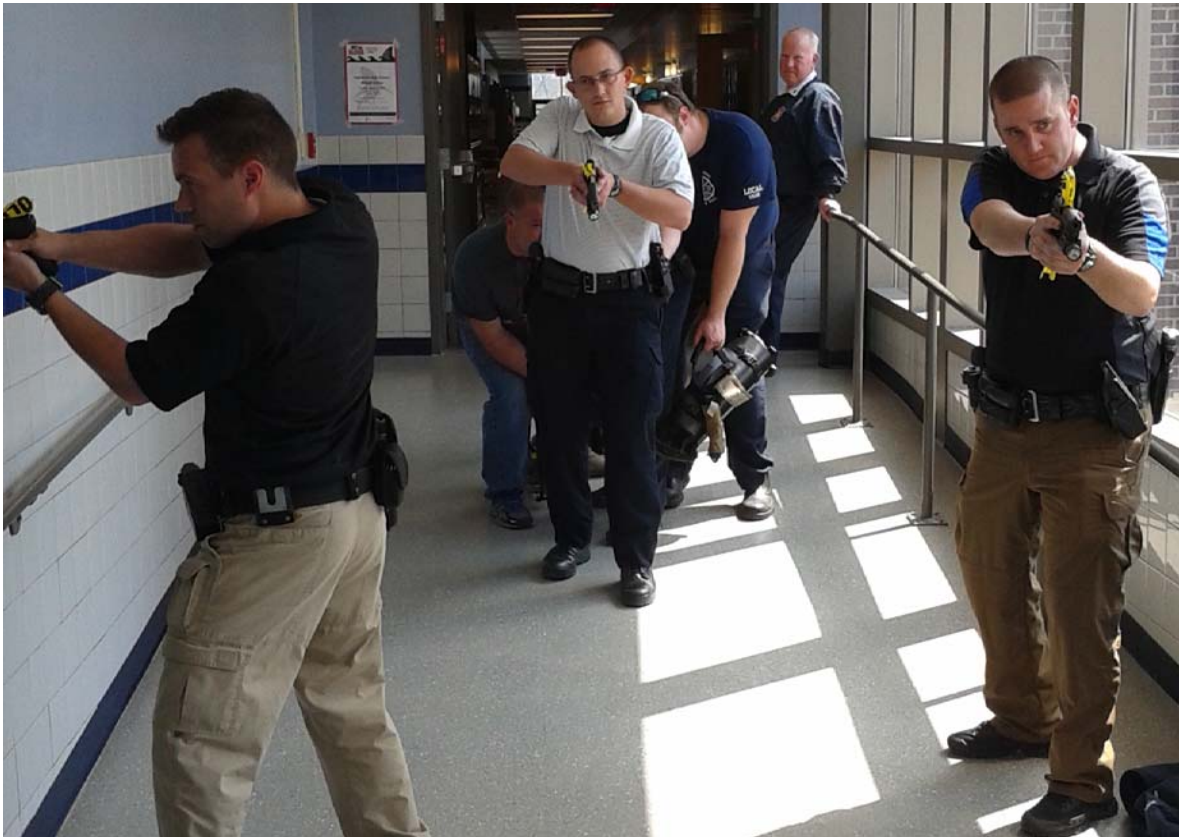

April 2016 Monthly Report Summary

COMMUNITY EVENTS:



Active Shooter Training: Fort Thomas officers teamed up with soldiers from the 478th Engineering Battalion in Tower Park to conduct Active Shooter Training for the Army Reserve Center. The two day training instructed both armed and unarmed military personnel in responses to an active shooter event. It also represents the beginning of an unprecedented cooperative effort between our police department and our local military. Both organizations are looking forward to future collaborative training. Fort Thomas Police thanks our men and women in the military for their service!

Officer William Hunt provided a tour of the police department to approximately 35 students from Bluebird Pre-School. He also answered all their questions and let the children explore the police cruisers.

TRAINING:

Detective Micheal Rowland attended Basic Narcotics Investigators School – DEA. This course is designed to enhance the skills and knowledge of patrol officers and investigators in the use of covert/undercover techniques to investigate crime. Instruction will be provided by the United States Drug Enforcement Administration. This course meets the statutory requirements regarding Asset Forfeiture training. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the

student to identify state and federal narcotics laws, steps for investigating conspiracy cases, analyze intelligence and conduct surveillance. The student will be able to identify trends in drug trafficking, drug identification, field testing, preservation of evidence and court presentation. The student will also be able to identify techniques in conducting undercover operations, confidential source debriefing, as well as raid planning and execution.

Lieutenant Jamey Gadzala and Officer Matt Marksbury attended Stress and Wellness. This course is designed to enhance the ability of law enforcement officers in the development of plans or strategies that will enable them to better deal with occupational stress and/or traumatic events. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the student to identify occupational stressors and their effects both physically and emotionally; identify stress coping techniques; identify symptoms, effects and types of therapies associated with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder; identify the emotional effects and consequences cynicism has on the law enforcement officer; identify sound nutritional and fitness strategies to offset the effects of stress; identify the characteristics of a successful career development program.



Range Training: Ft. Thomas Police officers had range training this month in accordance with policy and conducted their spring pistol qualification. Officers continued their focus on important contemporary issues in law enforcement and were instructed on counter ambush skills and de-escalation methods participating in numerous drills emphasizing these techniques and making the most of their limited training time.

Police Officers Doug Bryant, Adam Peak, and Sergeant Chris Carpenter along with Firefighters Captain Chris Amon, Steve Lump, and Lieutenant Tammy Webster provided training to the staff of the Fort Thomas Police and Fire Departments, officers from Dayton Police, AiG Public Safety, and the US Army Reserve Center. The two day training covered SAVE (Swift Assisted Victim Extraction). The SAVE Program is a task force concept combining a law enforcement (security) element and an emergency medical service element to rapidly assess, treat, and extract casualties at incidents involving an active shooter(s) at a public assembly occupancy. The SAVE system is designed to address the objectives of casualty recovery and treatment during incidents involving an active shooter(s), where existing Fire/EMS protocols for scene safety and extraction do not suffice.

Officer Matt Marksbury attended Legal Issues: 2016. This course provides in-class instruction of legal topics by providing a review of recent court decisions and legislative changes to the laws that are applicable to the Kentucky Revised Statutes. This course meets the statutory requirements regarding Asset Forfeiture training. In this course, the student will be able to discuss current developments on the constitutional topics of laws of arrest, search and seizure, pretrial identification procedures, interviews and interrogations and revisions to Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 218A - the Commonwealth's drug enforcement statutes.

RECOGNITION:

Chief Mike Daly received a thank you letter from TACTICA Ministries in San Jose, Costa Rica. The Director wrote to thank Chief Daly for the generous donation of a ballistic shield. He states the equipment will be an excellent training tool that will serve in the training process of countless officers.

ENFORCEMENT:

In April, officers wrote 10 speeding charges, 5 DUI charges, 25 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 99 traffic charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 113 written warnings and totaled 27 court appearances. There were 35 drug related charges placed against 24 adults. Three of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 32 of the charges.
