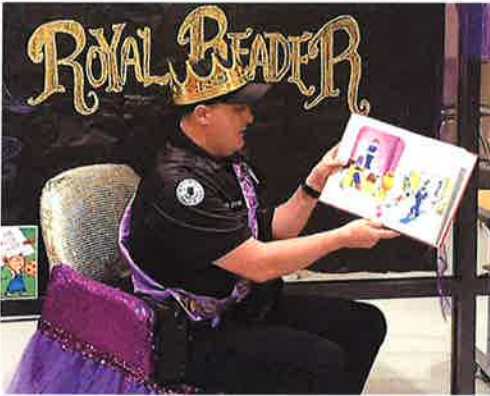

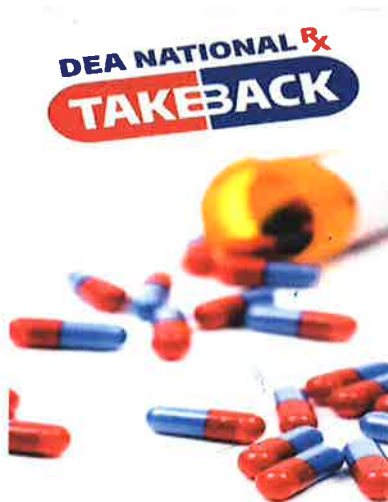
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## April 2019 Monthly Report Summary

### COMMUNITY EVENTS



Officer Sean Donelan was invited to be a "Royal Reader" for the three Kindergarten classes at Ruth Moyer Elementary School. Sean read two books to the kids and provided them with police badge stickers. As an added bonus, Officer Donelan stayed for lunch with the kids!



Detective Nick Hoffman and Officer Sean Donelan participated in the nationwide DEA Drug Take Back Day. The two provided a drive-thru service in front of the city building to gather old, outdated and unused medications. Hoffman and Donelan collected 8 large boxes full of medications. The boxes were then delivered to the DEA's Cincinnati pickup location, so that they could be incinerated. The program helps keep the drugs off the streets, out of our sewers, landfills and out of the hands of those for whom the medication was not prescribed. ### TRAINING:

**The Campbell County Crime Scene Unit** trained with their newest piece of equipment the "FARO". Officers trained on the proper use of the equipment by running scans of a mock scene and then transferring those scans to a program to be used for court presentation that recreates the events of the scene including measurements and evidence. Fort Thomas Detective Nick Hoffman and Sergeant Adam Noe, members of the Crime Scene Unit, were present at the training.

Officer Adam Peak attended ***The National Lifesavers Conference on Highway Safety Priorities*** which is the largest gathering of highway safety professionals in the United States. The Lifesavers Conference brings together a unique combination of traffic safety and public health professionals, researchers, advocates, practitioners and students committed to sharing best practices, research and policy initiatives that are proven to work. During the 2½ day conference, attendees had the opportunity to attend more than 80 workshops in 10 tracks including impaired and distracted driving; criminal justice/law enforcement; teen and older drivers; pedestrian and bicyclist safety; occupant protection for children and adults; new vehicle technology; and communication/public outreach. They also learned about the latest trends, research and cutting-edge programs that can be put into practice in our state/community.

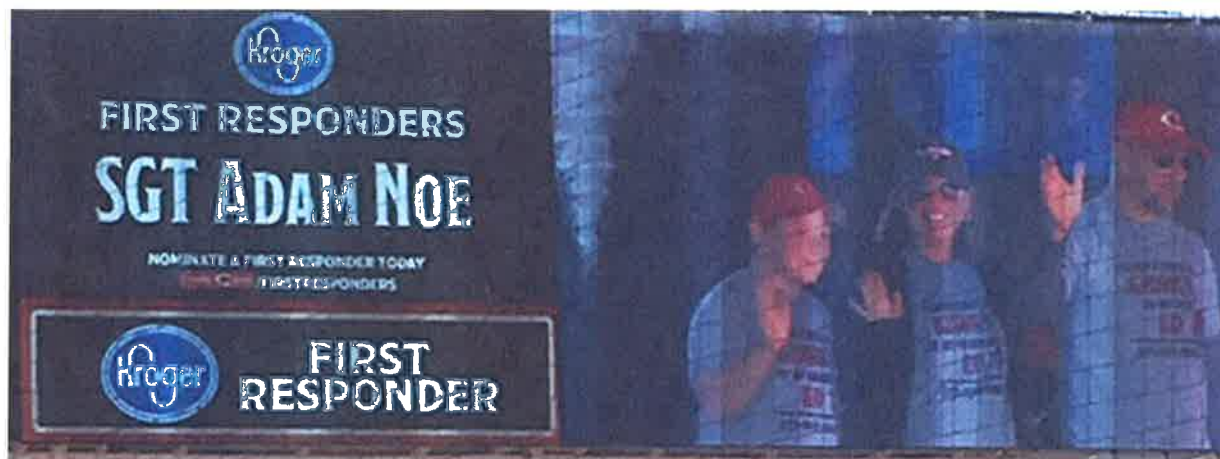
Officer Matt Marksbury attended ***Critical Officer Skills***. This course focused on skills which officers must possess and maintain proficiency in order to do their jobs safely and effectively. This course is designed to enhance the skills and knowledge of law enforcement officers in vehicle operations, tactical medical skills, officer rescue, and counter-ambush situations with the use of non-lethal training weapons and ammunition. It will incorporate instruction on vehicle close quarter combat (CQB), which includes transitioning into live-fire drills. This training is designed to heighten the critical skills of all patrol officers.

Lieutenants Rich Whitford and Brent Moening attended ***Current Leadership Issues for Mid-Level Executives – 2019***. This course is designed for mid-level executives (lieutenants, captains, majors) with an emphasis on current leadership issues. It will include a Kentucky Law Enforcement Update, Legal Update and specialized guest speakers from around the state and nation. It is geared for the mid-level executive who has completed the basic leadership courses offered and needs annual updates to maintain proficiency. This course meets the statutory requirements regarding Asset Forfeiture Training. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the student to be able to identify the most current leadership, administrative and legal issues confronting midlevel managers within a law enforcement agency.

Chief Casey Kilgore attended the ***FBI National Academy Conference*** in Lexington, Kentucky. This conference brings together past graduates of the FBI National Academy for a week of training and networking. Several guest speakers presented on topics including: Reducing Line of Duty Deaths, Pulse Night Club Case Study, Legal Updates, Civil Unrest, and Managing Police Trauma. Several police leaders and FBI agents from across the state and country were in attendance.

Officer Tom Carr attended ***Stress and Wellness***. This course is designed to enhance the ability of law enforcement officers in the development of plans or strategies that will enable them to better deal with occupational stress and/or traumatic events. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the student to identify occupational stressors and their effects both physically and emotionally; identify stress coping techniques; identify symptoms, effects and types of therapies associated with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder; identify the emotional effects and consequences cynicism has on the law enforcement officer; and identify sound nutritional and fitness strategies to offset the effects of stress. This course includes two after hours assignments that are required for successful completion of the training.

## MISCELLANEOUS:



Sergeant Adam Noe was honored at the Cincinnati Reds game as the Kroger First Responder. He was invited to attend the game and was recognized during the game. His parents, his wife Tiffany and their two sons, Alex and Jaxson joined him for this special recognition.

Four members of the Police Department took part in the Annual Kentucky Police Officer's Association 3-Gun Competition at the Airport Range. All members competed exceptionally well and qualified for the State Championship match later on this year in Boonesborough, KY. Officers Brad Reichenbach, Michael Dietz, Brandon Laffin, and Joe Paolucci finished 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th place, respectively. They all represented Fort Thomas well and are a prime example of the dedication and commitment that the Police Department has to its firearms training and instruction.

**REMINDER.....**The 2019 Northern Kentucky Police Memorial Service will be held on Wednesday, May 15<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 am at the Northern Kentucky Police Memorial located at the foot of the Suspension Bridge in Covington, Kentucky. Everyone is invited to attend.

## ENFORCEMENT:

In April, officers wrote 23 speeding charges, 17 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 101 traffic charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 93 written warnings and totaled 34 court appearances. There were 16 drug related charges placed against 7 adults and 2 juveniles. Four of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 7 of the charges.

- ◆ Sergeant Adam Noe and Detective Nick Hoffman attended a CSU Training for their new FARO 3D Scanner. This training made sure that all members of the CSU could operate the equipment. The FARO scanner saves time and manpower for scene documentation. This equipment documents an entire scene through photographs and measurements. Once a scan is complete, CSU members can upload it to a computer and create a 3D model of the scene or a walk-through video of the scene.
