June 2019 Monthly Report Summary

COMMUNITY EVENTS

TRAINING:

Officer Sean Donelan attended ***Firearms Instructor Update***. This course is designed to provide firearm instructors with updated information concerning current topics, trends, and instructional techniques. The course covered firearms related issues including use of force, threat pattern recognition, and other relevant topics. Students must supply an agency authorized handgun, holster, three magazines, magazine pouches, 3 pistol magazines, a patrol rifle, off duty or backup handgun, weapon cleaning equipment, baseball cap, eye and hearing protection, body armor, flashlight, and referee style whistle. There was one low light session scheduled during the training.

Lieutenant Chris Carpenter, Officers Doug Bryant, Michael Dietz, Zac Rohlfer, and Matt Marksbury attended the ***Annual Ohio Tactical Officers Association Conference***. This is a weeklong conference that includes a day of debriefs and presentations, a vendor show, and three days of training. Training topics taken by the officers included firearm training, leadership, active shooter, defensive tactics, and armorer level courses. Information gained in this training is brought back to teach to the rest of the department and better the overall level of training within the agency.

Officer Zac Rohlfer attended the ***National Association of School Resource Officers Conference***. The NASRO conference brought together school resource officers, law enforcement, school board members, school administrators, and others to receive superior training and networking opportunities. Attendees received thirty hours of training; they were exposed to the latest technology and innovations; completed a NASRO Training course; and networked with SROs, School Administrators, Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police from around the world.

Lieutenant Brent Moening and Sergeants William Hunt and Adam Noe attended ***Media Relations/Crisis Management Training***. This course is designed to provide assistance to law enforcement officials in dealing with today's hyper-connected world through media and public relations, communication strategies, crisis management, and engaging with the public to gain fuller knowledge of the vital role the police play in their lives.

Officer Zac Rohlfer attended the ***AR15/M16/M4/AR308 Armorer Course***. This course covers the weapons systems made and their variants. Officers will be certified in the proper maintenance, care, and repair of these weapons systems, including semi-auto and select-fire trigger systems.

Pursuant to KACP Accreditation Standard 29.2, regarding training on Hazardous Materials and 29 CFR 1910.120(q)(6), officers were mandated to watch the required DOT training video for awareness levels. This is in conjunction with officers having access to the NAERG books to increase awareness levels for first responders. 2016 NAERG books were provided as a resource as well to officers and are available for future reference.

RECOGNITION:

Officer Brandon Laffin has received the "Police Officer of the Year" Award from the Campbell County Rotary Club. Officer Laffin was nominated by several of his fellow officers after he saved a man's life on the side of the interstate. Brandon is an excellent police officer who is very dedicated to our community.

ENFORCEMENT:

In June, officers wrote 12 speeding charges, 50 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 131 traffic charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 53 written warnings and totaled 32 court appearances. There were 23 total drug related charges placed against 13 adults and 2 juveniles. Five of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 10 of the charges.

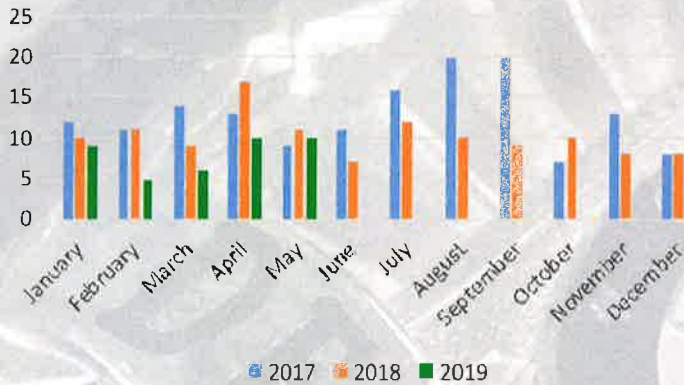

Training

- ◆ Detective Nick Hoffman was recently accepted into Phase 2 of the Kentucky Criminalistics Academy (KCA). Phase 2 consists of five weeks of training in the areas of bloodstain pattern identification and documentation, body farm- osteology lectures and practical, surface skeletons and clandestine grave excavation & documentation, basic fingerprint recognition and comparison techniques, explosives investigations, and arson investigations. Detective Hoffman is a member of the Campbell County Crime Scene team, and this training will aid him in his future investigations.

- ◆ During the course of an investigation led by Detective Nick Hoffman, the "Fort Thomas Police, in conjunction with the Kenton County Regional SWAT charged three people after executing a search warrant at Royal Cove Apartments on Waterworks Road on June 10 just before 6:00 a.m. Justin Andrew Justin Andrew Cahill, 32, of Fort Thomas, Geoffrey William Eugene Routzon, 33, of Newport, and Kristina Marie Vickers, 39, of Fort Thomas were all charged with the following: Possession of a controlled substance, 1st degree, 1st offense, (Methamphetamine), Class D Felony, and Drug Paraphernalia-Buy/Possess." - Quote from Fort Thomas Matters . 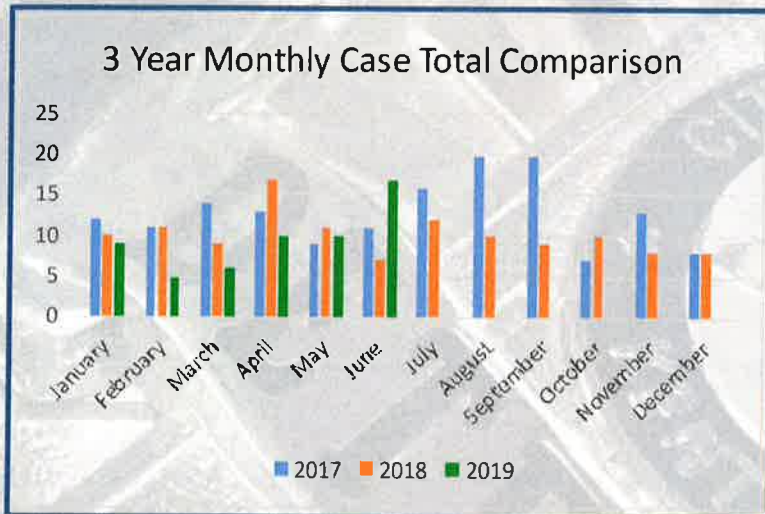

Fort Thomas Police Investigations

June 2019 Monthly Report

June was a very busy month for our detectives as they received 17 new cases. Detectives investigated five theft cases involving theft of packages, theft of lawn equipment, and thefts from vehicles. There were two vehicles reported stolen, and two separate reports of robbery and burglary. One of the reports ended in the arrest of six people.

Trending

- On the night of June 12th, Officers were dispatched to a residence on Burney Lane for a report of an active burglary. The victim gave a description of two men who broke into his home and assaulted him. Third shift Officers Dutle, Marksbury, and Laffin quickly located the vehicle and detained the men inside the car. Detective Faught was called to the scene and led the investigation into the burglary. The investigation revealed that the men met the complainant in Alexandria so they could rob him during a drug deal. When the complainant escaped, they followed him back to his house in Fort Thomas and broke into his home in order to assault him. The five men were arrested and charged with Robbery and Burglary. The victim was also eventually arrested for drug charges and unrelated theft charges.
- Detectives Derek Faught and Nick Hoffman assisted the Northern Kentucky Drug Strike Force with "Operation River Sweep" on June 20th. Members of the Strike Force and several surrounding police agencies arrested 20 people after six months of investigation conducted by the Strike Force. Fort Thomas Detective Micheal Rowland played an active role in the investigations as he is currently assigned to the Strike Force. In addition to the arrests, there were seven search warrants obtained that resulted in the seizure of 358 grams of crystal meth, 289 fentanyl pills, 64 grams of fentanyl powder, 4.6 grams of heroin, 11.3 grams of cocaine, 2,248 grams of marijuana, three loaded firearms and more than \$11,000 in cash. This type of enforcement action helps to keep drugs off our streets, and serves as a deterrent to other criminals who intend to do business in Northern Kentucky!
