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June 2016 Monthly Report Summary

COMMUNITY EVENTS:



Officer Adam Peak had the honor of conducting a Bike Rodeo along with the Campbell County Public Library Ft. Thomas Branch and Reser Bicycle Outfitters. The event was hosted at the library by the Children’s Learning Center with the hope of becoming a larger scale annual event. A wide range of cycling experience was displayed with children arriving on big wheels, training wheels, and mountain

bikes. Reser provided bike safety checks and maintenance before riders learned key bicycle safety tips from Officer Peak. The children then began traversing several courses and obstacles geared toward teaching awareness, bicycle control, and safety. Officer Peak demonstrated the skill and then coached the young riders helping them to become more confident in themselves and their cycling abilities. The children had a lot of fun riding and challenging themselves!



Officer Derek Faught spoke to two classes of Tiny Tots Campers at the Recreation Department for “Heroes Week”. His topics included the daily responsibilities of an officer, the equipment an officer carries, the types of calls that officers respond to and what constitutes an emergency. He also emphasized the fact that police officers are here to help kids, and they can trust the police. They sent him “high fives” to thank the police for what they do.

Officer William Hunt gave a presentation to students in one of the Fort Thomas Schools summer enrichment classes. The students were given information on modern fingerprinting and evidence collection. There were about twenty students in the class studying how Sherlock Holmes investigated crimes in the 19th century.

TRAINING:

Sergeant Chris Goshorn and Officer Derek Faught attended Legal Issues: 2016. This course provides in-class instruction of legal topics by providing a review of recent court decisions and legislative changes to the laws that are applicable to the Kentucky Revised Statutes. This course meets the statutory requirements regarding Asset Forfeiture training. In this course, the student will be able to discuss current developments on the constitutional topics of laws of arrest, search and seizure, pretrial identification procedures, interviews and interrogations and revisions to Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 218A - the Commonwealth's drug enforcement statutes.

Officer Adam Brown attended Current Issues for Patrol Officers. This course is designed to enhance an officer's knowledge concerning current issues and trends impacting law enforcement. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the student to identify current issues, problems, and possible solutions dealing with police and community relations, police ethics, threat groups, street crimes, use of force updates, veteran's issues, law enforcement technology and conflict resolution.

Officer Adam Peak attended Collision Analysis and Reconstruction. This two week course is designed to teach students the proper procedures for analyzing or reconstructing motor vehicle collisions through lecture and hands on training. Level 1 focuses on mathematical formulas and physics in order to ascertain the vehicle's actions prior to and during the motor vehicle collision. The course focused on evidence identification, documentation, and preservation and how to use these details to gain factual evidence to present before the courts. The class culminated with creating scale diagramming to provide accurate representation and location for roadway evidence such as skid marks, striations, gouges, and yaw marks. Students then used this information and measurements in their mathematical formula to get factual evidence such as the minimum speeds, stopping distance, and perception and reaction times.

Officer Nick Hoffman attended Desert Snow Law Enforcement Training 3 Day Hands-On Workshop. Topics included: Passenger Vehicle - Criminal & Terrorist Identification & Apprehension Workshop. Specialized training developed to Help Identify and intercept those transporting illegal narcotics, weapons, bulk currency, explosives, and other types of contraband.

Officer Derek Faught attended Field Training Officer Program. Topics covered included leadership, safety, ethics, and documentation of performance of trainees. The class provided the information necessary to properly train, evaluate and document a trainee's progress while they are going through field training.

RECOGNITION:

Officer Adam Peak received a thank you letter from a disabled motorist on I-471 on a cold February night. The driver was taken home by a friend; however, the vehicle was left sticking out in the right hand lane of the expressway. Officer Peak saw the disabled vehicle, pulled behind it and called the owner to make sure she was safe and not on the highway walking. He told her he would stay parked behind her vehicle with the cruiser lights on until the tow truck arrived. She states that she was terribly upset and shaken by the incident but Officer Peak was able to calm her down and re-assure her everything would be ok. Even though it happened months ago the driver states she has not forgotten Officer Peak's name or the assistance he provided. She ends the letter by thanking us for hiring officers like Officer Peak to save idiots like her when they do not know what they are doing!

Officer Sean Donelan received a thank you Chief Andy Williams, Wilder Police Chief and NKY Police Chief's Association President. He wrote thank Officer Donelan for his participation with this year's memorial ceremony. He states Sean did an excellent job as detail director, calling commands and leading the participants.

Officer Adam Peak received thank you note from the Campbell County Public Library for his participation in their first ever Bike Rodeo. The librarian states Officer Peak set up a fun and challenging safety course and interacted well with all the riders.

Sergeant Chris Carpenter and Officer Sean Donelan received a thank you letter from Dayton Police Chief David Halfhill. He writes to extend his thank you Chris and Sean for presenting the Run, Hide, and Fight Active Shooter training to the teachers in the Dayton school district. He said he has had nothing but positive feedback from the school superintendent and teachers. A teacher commented "it was eye opening; we walked out exhausted, mentally drained, and different people then when we entered. Another commented "the training made us more aware, better educated and united in an effort to be proactive and protect our treasured students in a world than can be pretty scary sometimes." He ends the letter stating these officers are a big asset to our department and we should be proud to have such fine officers.

The entire department received a thank you card from retired Fort Thomas Police Chief Mike Bischoff and his wife Jackie. They wrote the inspections of their property while they were away gave them tremendous peace of mind.

MISCELLANEOUS

A Rumpke truck driving northbound on S Ft Thomas Avenue from Alexandria Pike was leaking hydraulic oil causing one lane on S Ft Thomas Avenue to be shut down for several hours. The Police Department provided traffic direction because of the slick conditions on the road. Along with the Fire Department Rumpke had a company respond to assist with the clean-up of the oil. Chief Mark Bailey has invoiced the responsible party for all expenses incurred by the City.

ENFORCEMENT:

In June, officers wrote 13 speeding charges, 4 DUI charges, 36 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 60 traffic charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 82 written warnings and totaled 48 court appearances. There were 16 drug related charges placed against 10 adults and 1 drug charge placed against a juvenile. One of the individuals is a Fort Thomas resident. Traffic stops led to 4 of the charges.

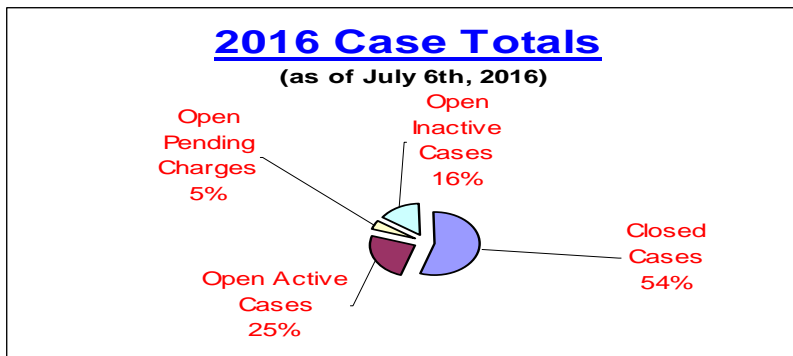
Fort Thomas Police Investigations June 2016 Monthly Report

(Information as of July 6th, 2016)



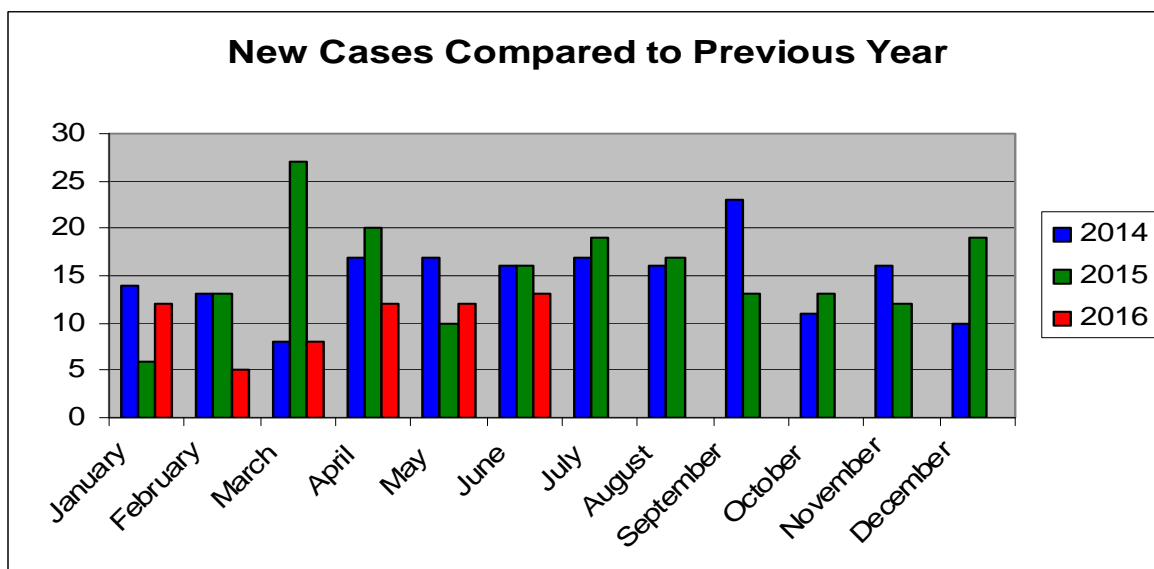
Fort Thomas Detectives have received 13 new cases in June. Our Detectives continue to stay busy following up on leads that have resulted in several charges and arrests of subjects breaking into cars and committing burglaries in the city. They are also diligently working to solve additional cases that keep coming in related car break-ins throughout the city in addition to several other larger investigations.

The chart below shows the Criminal Investigations numbers at the halfway point of the year.



Investigation Updates

- Detectives are actively following up on leads related to the numerous thefts from vehicles. Detectives are also working with neighboring agencies, which have experienced the same incidents, in attempts to identify the suspect(s).
- Detectives responded to and are still working on the incident at Fort Thomas Pizza late this past month. Charges have been filed against the suspect.
- A suspect has been identified, arrested, charged with several car break-ins and a burglary on the south end of the city. This was a collaborated effort that began with diligent work of the first officers on scene.
- All leads have been exhausted in the BP robbery case. If anyone has any information they are encouraged to contact Detective Adam Noe at 859-572-1271 with information.
