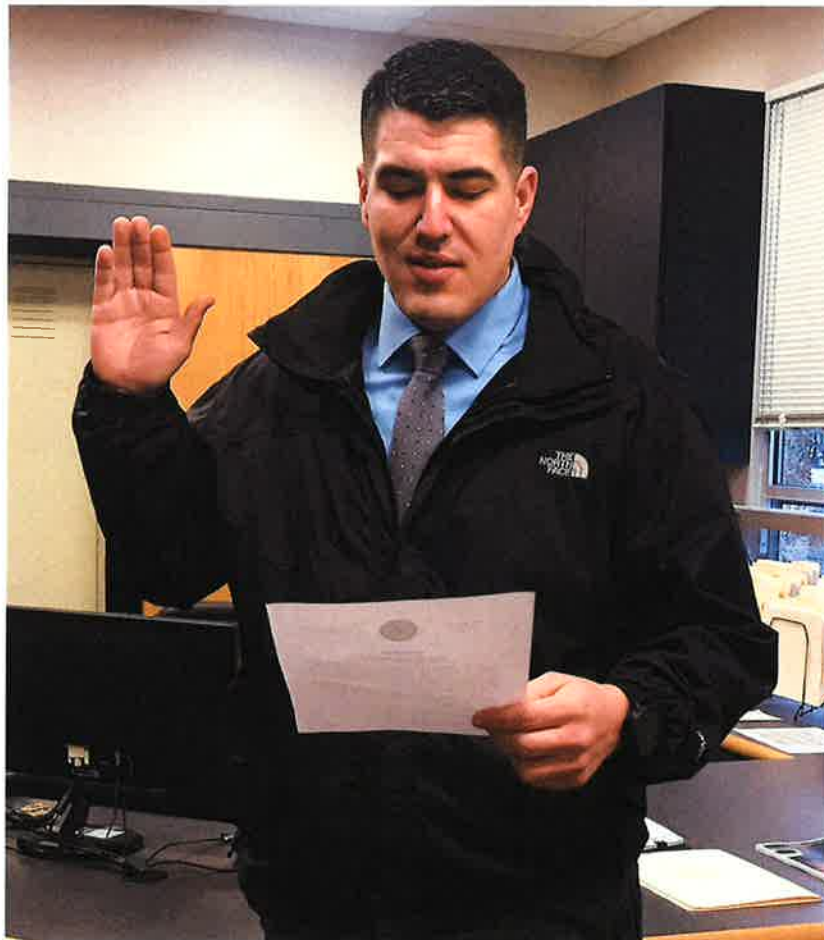

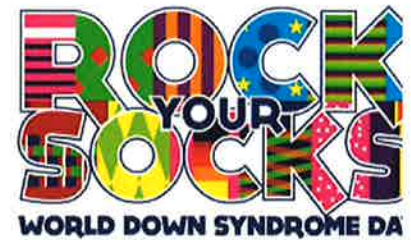
COMMUNITY EVENTS

Sergeant Nathan Day and Officer Sean Donelan provided a hands-on tour of the Police Department for Cub Scout Pack 771 of Moyer Elementary School. The kids toured the office, gym, evidence collection areas and were able to see the functions of a patrol vehicle. The kids were shown how a fingerprint card is made for background checks and investigations and how to lift a latent fingerprint, using dust and lift tape. The boys had great questions about the day-to-day activities of a police officer.

School Resource Officer Zac Rohlfer spoke to Johnson Elementary fifth grade students regarding the Bill of Rights. The students have been discussing this in class. The students asked Officer Rohlfer questions they had relating to real life situations. Officer Rohlfer was impressed with not only the amount of questions they had but the time and effort they put into researching questions regarding this topic.

Officer Matt Marksbury provided Taser Training to the Dayton Police Department. The department received an updated copy (Version 21) of the Taser Power Point and warnings and an overview of the information. During the hands-on portion of the training, the officers demonstrated a functionality test along with putting the cartridge on correctly and proper technique. Officers had to shoot 2 cartridges into a target splitting the beltline.

The Kenton County Regional SWAT staff conducted active shooter response training to approximately 34 Kenton County Public Library staff members. Training consisted of 1 hour of PowerPoint lecture on run, hide, fight responses. Dr. Stava also provided a block of instruction on Stop the Bleed procedures involving tourniquets, compressed gauze, and chest seals. This was followed by several static scenarios and instruction on evacuation routes, fortifying rooms and various doors, and engaging an assailant as a last resort. A KCRS member donned a protective suit to accommodate these latter portions of training. Blank rounds were also fired. The final portion of training consisted of dynamic scenarios that included firing more blank rounds, members of KCRS in High Gear suits that required staff members to go hands-on to subdue the role players, and either building of barricades or evacuations by staff. A debrief of the training session with staff occurred immediately after the final scenario.

TRAINING:

Officers Adam Peak and Brandon Laffin attended **Field Training Officer (FTO)**. This course is designed to provide knowledge and training to develop Field Training Officers' skills. Each new FTO will be presented with ideas and techniques to assist them in becoming more professional and confident in the application of their skills. A partial list of skills the FTO will be able to complete include: identify liability issues; complete the daily observation report; understand performance evaluations; instruct from training briefs; understand the purpose of program management and control; and develop a scenario and additional training plans.

Sergeant Adam Noe and Officer Adam Peak attended the **FARO Forensic Workshop** hosted at the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department in Northern Cincinnati. Representing the Campbell County Crime Scene Unit and Major Accident Reconstruction Team, respectively. They received duty relevant base level training that will be applied when utilizing the county's newly acquired FARO 70M laser scanner. The workshop involved physically scanning rooms staged as crime scenes as well as vehicles, collecting millions of data points during the scans. The work shop then walked officers through FARO's Scene Software. Using it in a final project merge, the scans together created a real life scale 3D workable project and fly through of the scene that could be presented in a court trial.

Officer Sean Donelan attended **Collaborative Leadership**. The course is designed to expose and imprint the principles of Collaborative Leadership with leaders in a public safety organization. Students do not need to be appointed to or promoted to position of authority of their respective agencies. Students will be required to work jointly on projects, and be exposed to opposing arguments to develop strategies to address current issues. Emphasis will be given to creating a goal and vision driven approach across the organization for issue resolution. Students will view issues from the stakeholder's position, not the interest of those determining the outcomes through the use of case studies from both the private and public sectors.

Officers completed DOCJT Acadis training on **KY ID Law Enforcement Training Guide**. The training presentation familiarized officers with the advanced security features of the new Kentucky State ID's and driver's licenses.

Chief Casey Kilgore, Lieutenant Brent Moening, Officer Wayne Dutle, and Detectives Derek Faught and Nick Hoffman attended ***FBI Behavioral Analysis Unit Training***. Instructors were from FBI's Behavioral Analysis Unit at Quantico, VA. Topics included Active Shooter; Pre-Attack Behaviors and Motivations; Violence Crime Apprehension Program (ViCap); No Body Homicide Alternative Interview Methods; and Pitfalls of Subject Interviews.

Sergeant Nathan Day and Detective Derek Faught attended ***Child Abuse Investigations***. This course is designed to enhance the skills of law enforcement officers who are responsible for investigating child abuse. Topics included child abuse prevention; child fatality review; Kentucky child abuse laws; child physical abuse; pediatric abusive head trauma; the nexus between child abuse and technology; missing children; child sexual abuse; interrogating the abuser; child sex abuser typology; team approach to child sexual abuse prosecution; and interviewing the victims and witnesses. This class also addressed the need for a multidisciplinary approach to child abuse investigations and prosecutions. This class included four hours of blended learning with a pre-class assignment due the first morning of class.

Officers completed the following ***Policy and Procedure Operations Roll Call Training***: Handcuffs & Restraints; Residential & Vehicle Lockouts; Alarm Responses; Prisoner Transport; Traffic Control; and Vehicle Impound.

MISCELLANEOUS:

Officer Brad Reichenbach has joined the Fort Thomas Police Department and began work as a Patrol Officer March 28. He comes to the department from the Kentucky State Police and has been a police officer for six years. He has been through two police academies, the one in Richmond and one specifically for state patrol officers. Officer Reichenbach is currently completing his eight weeks of Field Training. Brad is originally from Standford, KY and his father is a police officer as well. Brad now resides in Florence and in May will marry his finance Natasha. Please welcome Brad to our "Fort Thomas Family."

ENFORCEMENT:

In March, officers wrote 73 speeding charges, 21 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 122 traffic charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 109 written warnings and totaled 16 court appearances. There were 20 drug related charges placed against 10 adults and 2 juveniles. Three of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 13 of the charges.

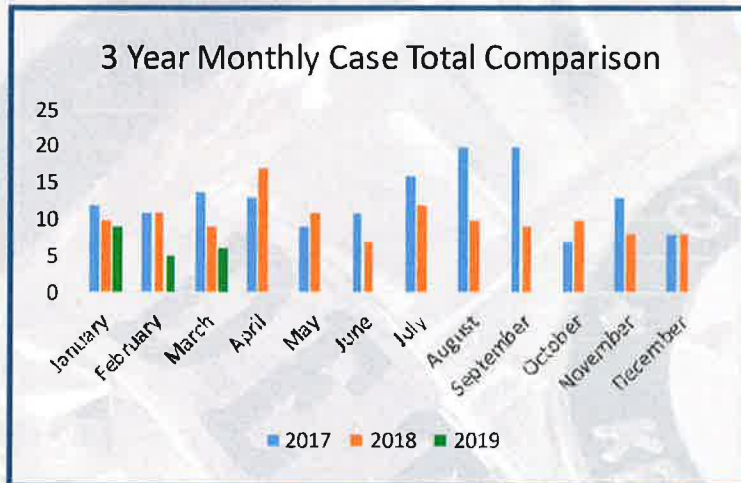

Training

- On March 5th and 6th, Detectives Derek Faught and Nick Hoffman, along with Chief Casey Kilgore, Lieutenant Brent Moening, and Patrolman Wayne Dutle, attended training at the Boone County Sheriff's Office presented by the Behavioral Analysis Unit (BAU) of the FBI. Members of the BAU help to profile and identify perpetrators of unusual crimes such as homicide and rape. Our officers learned to detect pre-attack behaviors by active shooters, received instruction from Special Agents on how to solve no body homicides, and how to avoid common pitfalls in interviews with suspects. The BAU is a valuable resource for American Law Enforcement!
- From March 25-March 29, Detective Derek Faught and Sergeant Nathan Day attended Child Abuse Investigation at the Department of Criminal Justice Training (DOCJT). The course included training in the topics of child abuse prevention, child fatality review, Kentucky child abuse laws, child physical abuse, pediatric abusive head trauma, the relationship between child abuse and technology, missing children, child sexual abuse, interrogating the abuser, and tips on interviewing witnesses. The Fort Thomas Police Department is committed to preventing child abuse and bringing child abusers to justice!

Trends

- During the month of March, officers received several new reports of scams targeting our citizens. Our victims lost over \$7,000 when they were deceived into purchasing Google Play gift cards for various fraudulent schemes.
