## *May 2016 Monthly Report Summary*

### **COMMUNITY EVENTS:**

Officer Nick Hoffman and Lieutenant Casey Kilgore had the honor of teaching bike safety skills to Tiger Scouts Troop 706. The scouts learned the ABC's of bike safety, how to properly fit their helmets, and safety rules of the road. After discussing safety, the scouts ran through several skills courses that were set up by Officer Hoffman. At the end of the day, the boys asked several questions about bike safety and policing in general. They were also allowed to tour two police cars. This event was a lot of fun for the scouts and the officers.

The Department provided police escorts for The 8th Annual Rolling Thunder POW/MIA Memorial Ride. The Ride of Remembrance began at the Army Reserve Center in Fort Thomas and ended at the World Peace Bell in Newport. A beloved Fort Thomas tradition, the local ride (Ohio Chapter 9) serves as a prologue to the national Rolling Thunder Memorial Ride held Memorial Day weekend in Washington D.C.

Chief Mike Daly attended a Scam Alerts News Conference in Louisville as a representative of the KACP. Attorney General Andy Beshear was the guest speaker and unveiled a new innovative anti-fraud initiative titled Scam Alerts. This is new messaging service, which allows his office to directly warn families when scammers are on attack. Scam Alerts are going to enhance their ability to help people avoid scams, abuse and exploitation. Please see the Attorney General's website for additional information.

### **TRAINING:**

Officer Brandon Laffin attended Illicit Drug Investigations. This course is designed to provide all law enforcement personnel with the training and information necessary to conduct inquiries and/or investigations concerning the transportation, sale and use of illegal drugs. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the student to identify investigative techniques and trends related to drugs confronting Kentucky Law Enforcement. Students will be able to identify issues that relate to the drug courier and drug identification. The student will also be able to identify the current trends in heroin, methamphetamine, club drugs, marijuana and the interdiction of drug parcels.

Lieutenant Rich Whitford and Detective Adam Noe attended the training on "What Sex Offenders Can Teach Us – Train the Trainer". The class was a cooperative effort between the Kentucky Attorney General and several other state agencies. This information will be put to use with NKY area prosecutors, law enforcement and the Child Advocacy Center to educate the public on how to protect our children better, what to look for in an offender and ways to report and deal with crimes.

Officer Adam Peak attended Basic Breath Test Operator. This course is designed to provide the law enforcement officer with the skills and knowledge to properly operate the Intoxilyzer 5000EN and 8000. Both lecture and practical skills are used in this course to enhance the proficiency of officers attending. Per 500 KAR 8:010, the successful completion of this course is required to become a certified breath test operator. At the conclusion of this course, the student will be able to explain alcohol's effect on the human body, as well as the operation of the breath test instruments. The officer will also be able to properly operate the Intoxilyzer 5000EN and 8000. Any Rank None This course certifies officers on the Intoxilyzer 5000EN and 8000.

Detective Adam Noe attended Internal Affairs Investigations. This course is intended for those police personnel who will be charged with investigating complaints against employees and for those who will oversee or manage the internal affairs process. Practical exercises are used in this course during which the student will interview a complainant and the accused officer. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the student to identify how to establish an internal affairs unit and the selection of personnel who will conduct internal affairs investigations. They will be able to identify how to take a statement from an accused employee and summarize that in an investigation. They will also be able to identify proper techniques in interviewing a complainant and later, the interview of the accused officer.

Officer William Hunt attended Criminal Investigation for First Responders. This course is designed to provide patrol personnel with the training necessary to conduct basic criminal investigations. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the student to: list the steps that should be followed when responding to a major crime scene; list the steps involved in documenting a domestic violence call; explain the importance of corroboration in the interviewing process; prepare a photo array; identify the objectives of a crime scene investigation and objectives of crime scene photography; distinguish between accidental and inflicted injuries of children. They will also be able to properly complete a search warrant affidavit.

Chief Mike Daly and Lieutenants Rich Whitford and Casey Kilgore attended the FBI National Academy Re-trainer conference in Covington, Kentucky. This conference brings together all of the past Kentucky graduates of the FBI National Academy, a very selective 10-week course that is offered to law enforcement leaders from around the world. These three officers were provided with training from some of the top speakers in the nation, including several medical doctors and PhDs. Topics of instruction included major case reviews, leadership, managing change, active shooters, digital technology, and proactive law enforcement strategies. The class was very well attended by police leaders from throughout Kentucky. The networking and information sharing opportunities were an additional benefit to our three officers, who are constantly seeking to learn from others and better our service to our community.

## **RECOGNITION:**

Chief Mike Daly received a thank you letter from Christopher Connors, Director of the Northern Kentucky Drug Strike Force. He wrote to extend his appreciation to the department for their annual donation and continued support of the unit.

The department received a thank you note from the Campbell County Dispatchers. They wrote to thank the department for the acknowledgment and nice gift in recognition of Dispatcher Appreciation Week. They stated it truly means a lot.

Sergeant Chris Carpenter and Officer Doug Bryant received a thank you letter from TACTICA Ministries. They traveled to San Jose, Costa Rica in order to provide tactical instruction to 112 members of the Costa Rican Police Forces and Tactical Medical Units. These officers paid for the entire cost of the trip out of their own pocket and also utilized their personal vacation time from work. The Director of TACTICA Ministries stated the level of professionalism, quality of instruction and the generosity displayed by these men was remarkable. They are certainly a credit to their department as well as to the community in which they serve.

The following newspaper article was featured in the Kentucky Enquirer and the Fort Thomas Recorder. It was written and submitted by Covington Attorney Phil Taliaferro. Mr. Taliaferro wrote "Reporter Chris Mayhew's article entitled "Fort Thomas officers patrol "heroin rush hour" was very enlightening. The three Fort Thomas Officers, Sergeant Chris Goshorn, and Officers Derek Faught and Nick Hoffman, are doing a fantastic job in the fight against heroin. The Fort Thomas Police Department's launching of the Heroin Interdiction Team (HIT) is an outstanding way to fight the epidemic. Police officers all over Northern Kentucky are risking their lives daily to protect our citizens from the dangers associated with heroin. These officers are working diligently to try to stop the devastating adverse effects of heroin on our community. I was touched by Officer Hoffman's stopping of the vehicle that had parents driving under the influence of heroin with their 16-month-old baby in the backseat. He probably saved the life of that little baby. Our citizens should be very proud and supportive of our Northern Kentucky police officers for the work they do in fighting heroin and we should thank them for their service to our community."

### **ENFORCEMENT:**

In May, officers wrote 17 speeding charges, 1 DUI charge, 33 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 71 traffic charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 97 written warnings and totaled 29 court appearances. There were 19 drug related charges placed against 13 adults and 3 drug charges placed against 2 juveniles. Five of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 6 of the charges.

# Fort Thomas Police Investigations April/May 2016 Monthly Report

Information as of June 3rd, 2016



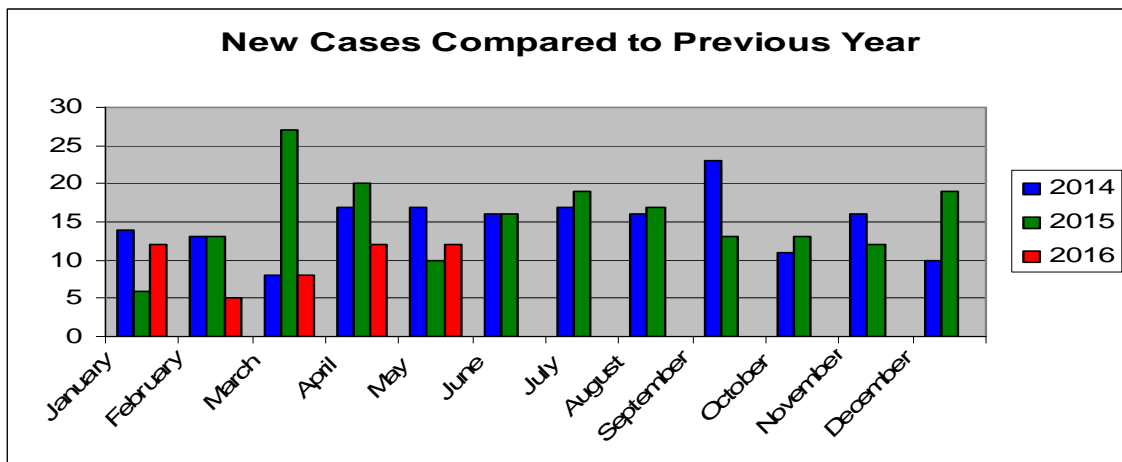
Fort Thomas Detectives have received 24 new cases between April and May. Our detectives have been extremely busy over the past 2 months working to solve several crimes in the city including a robbery, several car break-ins and burglaries to name a few. Through the collaboration and hard work with our patrol officers, we have been able to successfully close most of these cases resulting in multiple charges, recovery of property and found some suspects to be linked to other crimes within the city.

## Investigation Updates

- Detectives are still pursuing information regarding a robbery at the Fort Thomas BP gas station. No charges have been filed at this time.
- In early May, detectives were able to charge two adults and recover some expensive personal property from car break-ins in April. These car break-ins occurred within the city and other neighboring cities.
- On 5/22/2016 third shift officers responded to the middle school and were able to locate and detain two subjects (1 adult and 1 juvenile). Those subjects were subsequently interviewed and admitted to the break-in along with the prior two break-ins at the high school. They both implicated a third individual who will be charged with the two prior burglaries as well. He was not present for the third burglary at the middle school. During the interview, detectives were able to obtain information that will lead to charges in approximately 6-7 additional cases including other burglaries and car break-ins throughout the city.

## Training

- Lieutenant Whitford and Detective Noe attended the training on “What Sex Offenders Can Teach Us – Train the Trainer” in Lexington, KY. The class was a cooperative effort between the Kentucky Attorney General and several other state agencies. The class focused on more information than previously discussed in the general information class we attended in March. This information will be put to use with NKY area prosecutors, law enforcement and the Child Advocacy Center to educate the public on how to protect our children better, what to look for in an offender and ways to report and deal with crimes.
- Detective Noe attended the Kentucky Department of Criminal Justice Training “Internal Affairs” in Richmond, Ky.
