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October 2016 Monthly Report Summary

COMMUNITY EVENTS:

The Fort Thomas Police Department participated in the Recreation Department's "Touch-A-Truck" Event on October 1st. This event is designed to educate children and their families on different equipment, vehicles or tools that our emergency responders or private companies utilize on a daily basis.

Fort Thomas Police Officers participated in the National Walk to School Week. This is a fun way to practice safe routes for students, parents, and school officials. Officers offered the following safety tips to the students: walkers should always stay visible to drivers; walk/don't run; stay on the sidewalk; and cross streets at a crosswalk or intersection.

Members of the organization, Cookies for a Cop, dropped off cookies for our officers. This is the 3rd year for the organization. Last year they made and distributed approximately 110,000 cookies across the United States. Beginning this year, the event name will be changed to "Cookies for a Cop and our Fire Friends" so Fire Departments can be recipients of this thoughtful gesture. Volunteers in twenty-eight states participated and distributed over 90,000 cookies. The volunteers want to let everyone know this gift is not just a tray of cookies and treats but a hug for all you've endured, a prayer for your safety, and a thank you for continuing to be that face of courage and that shield of protection.



On October 27th the Recreation Department once again held the Pumpkin Walk at Tower Park. Approximately 3,000 people attended the event. VIPS member Marian Sizemore, State Farm Insurance, donated her photography skills and supplies to provide complimentary family photos. Officer Sean Donelan, distributed candy and stick on badges, and assisted with traffic control. The Fire Department, Lions Club, and the Campbell County FOP Lodge #10 donated and cooked 3,000 hotdogs and distributed bottled water. Officer Donelan also passed out candy at the Police Department on Halloween.

TRAINING:

Detective Micheal Rowland attended Fire Investigation Technician Course. This course provides the student with the fundamentals and technical knowledge needed for proper fire scene interpretations, including recognizing and conducting origin and cause, preservation of evidence and documentation, scene security, motives of the fire setter, and types of fire causes.

Officer Nick Hoffman attended Kentucky Criminalistics Academy: Crime Scene Technician Course. The Crime Scene Technician course is a 5-week training program designed to meet the needs of Kentucky Law Enforcement Agencies in the areas of evidence identification, collection and preservation. The course is designed to provide a well-rounded curriculum, which will be the foundation for further education and training. The Crime Scene Technician course is a prerequisite for acceptance into the next level of training, the 5 week Kentucky Criminalistics Academy. The learning outcomes for this course will be for the student to properly identify, document, collect and process evidence at a crime scene utilizing current techniques and technology.

Officers conducted their fall firearms training which included low light tactics, pistol and rifle manipulation, clearing malfunctions, team movement and communication, use of cover, and shooting positions. Ft. Thomas officers assigned to the Kenton County Regional SWAT team again provided instruction of advanced tactics, gained from their training on the team, to Ft. Thomas Officers. This advanced training of our street level officers has perhaps been the biggest advantage to participating in the Kenton County Regional SWAT team.

Officer Adam Peak attended the 3rd and final level of Vehicle Collision Investigation & Reconstruction. Level III training focused on advanced mathematical calculations, vehicle dynamics, crush damage analysis, advanced airborne equations, time and distance analysis, as well as quadratic equations and vector diagraming. Throughout the course investigators were instructed on the use of momentum formulas to calculate speed for all vehicles involved as well as any items that separated from the vehicles such as motorcycle collisions, and ejections. The course also included training on pedestrian strikes, motorcycle collisions, and commercial vehicle collisions. At the end of Level III investigators conducted a reconstruction analysis of a prior incident involving a law enforcement agency and a private citizen. Investigators were given limited information and photographs and were asked to complete momentum calculations and vector diagraming along with the use of other formulas to come up with the answers as to what each units minimum speed was, who was at fault, contributing factors if any, and if the primary unit had obeyed stop signs would the collision have ever taken place. This exercise allowed for investigators to use all of their training and have the opportunity to articulate their findings showing all had a full understanding of all three levels of this course.

MISCELLANEOUS:

Works of art were created as part of a Community Art Project designed by the 1st grade students at Ruth Moyer Elementary. Students have donated their artwork to the following businesses: the Fort Thomas City Building; 15 North Pizza; Top This Donut Bar, Belladance; Fort Thomas Central; US Postal Service Office; Fifth Third Banks; and Bowman's Framing. Thank you for your kindness and creativity. Please stop by and view the wonderful talent of Ruth Moyer's first graders.

ENFORCEMENT:

In October, officers wrote 18 speeding charges, 3 DUI charges, 25 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 87 traffic charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 71 written warnings and totaled 22 court appearances. There were 14 drug related charges placed against 8 adults. One of the individuals one is a Fort Thomas resident. Traffic stops led to 4 of the charges.


Investigation Updates
