October 2020 Monthly Report Summary

COMMUNITY EVENTS:



Officer Will Martin received the following thank you note. "Thank you for attending the Highlands Middle School Dance Team fundraiser! We appreciate your donation and allowing the girls to wash one of your patrol cars. What a wonderful community we live in!"

School Resource Officer Zac Rohlfer talked to three of the middle school technology classes about internet safety, social media safety, and legal issues surrounding those topics. They were instructed on best practices to keep themselves safe and out of legal trouble. Officer Rohlfer was able to provide real examples of issues the police department has dealt with as it relates to law and social media.

Sergeant Adam Noe and School Resource Officer Zac Rohlfer spoke to the High School Forensics class. Topics included the process of becoming a police officer, how to work in forensics, and general information about processing crime scenes.

School Resource Officer Zac Rohlfer spoke to St. Catherine's 6th, 7th, and 8th graders about social media, drugs, and vaping. They talked about the legal ramifications of social media and the dangers that exist with its usage. They covered basic illegal drug dangers and the students were able to see examples of actual drugs confiscated by FTPD. Lastly, the specific dangers of vaping, both THC and nicotine, and the rampant use of those by teens were discussed.

TRAINING:

Sergeant Derek Faught attended ***Duty to Intervene***. Though policies exist, that require intervention when witnessing inappropriate force by fellow officers, confusion, fear and established cultures are just some of the obstacles at the root cause of noncompliance. Those obstacles can destroy the lives of officers, departments and community. This timely course examined those realities and dived into solutions that focus on creating an effective culture and establishing trusting relationships that will result in a willing compliance of these intervention policies.

Officers Zac Rohlfer and Sean Donelan attended ***Troubleshooting the Pistol by Glock***. It is a training designed to orient the firearms instructor to a systematic process that will identify and isolate malfunctions related to the shooter, ammunition and the pistol. This helps instructors to properly diagnose malfunctions and select the correct remedy. There was also a block of instruction on the FBI's Wound Ballistic Protocol and a ballistic demonstration.

Officer Dietz attended ***Managing a Dynamic Tactical Problem for the Patrol Supervisor***. This webinar examined why most critical incident operations fail because mistakes made by the people and agencies assigned to handle them, not due to criminal resistance. In this one-hour webinar, the presenter will define and present two of the five characteristics of crisis that were covered in depth in the NTOA Supervising Patrol Critical Incidents Course. It will introduce you to principles present in every conflict during critical incidents, how to recognize them, and what actions to take to help you successfully manage a dynamic tactical problem within the first 60 minutes.

Detective Nick Hoffman attended ***Ethical Policing in Contemporary Times***. This class is designed to teach critical areas of law enforcement ethics and decision making that can be learned in an on-line format. The course covers a legal review, transparency, ethics, social media, de-escalation, use of force, 42 U.S.C § 1983 civil suits, decision-making, and other current topics in today's environment.

Officers completed the following ***Roll Call Training***: Officers reviewed the NKYEMA Missing Persons Tactical Worksheet and "Search for Missing Persons" PowerPoint. The PowerPoint presentation covered the different types of alerts for missing persons (i.e.: Golden Alerts, Amber Alerts, etc.) and each agency's role concerning a missing person. The Tactical Worksheet outlines a systematic checklist of responsibilities while responding to a report of an "active" missing person. Officers also completed a review of Policy Chapters 1.27 (Golden Alert) and 1.28 (Missing Persons).

MISCELLANEOUS:

Members of the organization, "Cookies for a Cop and our Fire Friends" dropped off cookies for our officers. This is the 7th year for the organization. Volunteers have made and delivered over 629,536 cookies to 29 states, 2 countries and over 700+ departments. The volunteers want to let everyone know this gift is not just a tray of cookies and treats but also a hug for all you have endured, a prayer for your safety, and a thank you for continuing to be that face of courage and that shield of protection.

ENFORCEMENT:

In October officers wrote 18 speeding charges, 35 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 50 traffic related charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 43 written warnings and totaled 50 court appearances. There were 43 drug related charges placed against 22 adults. Six of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 18 of the charges.

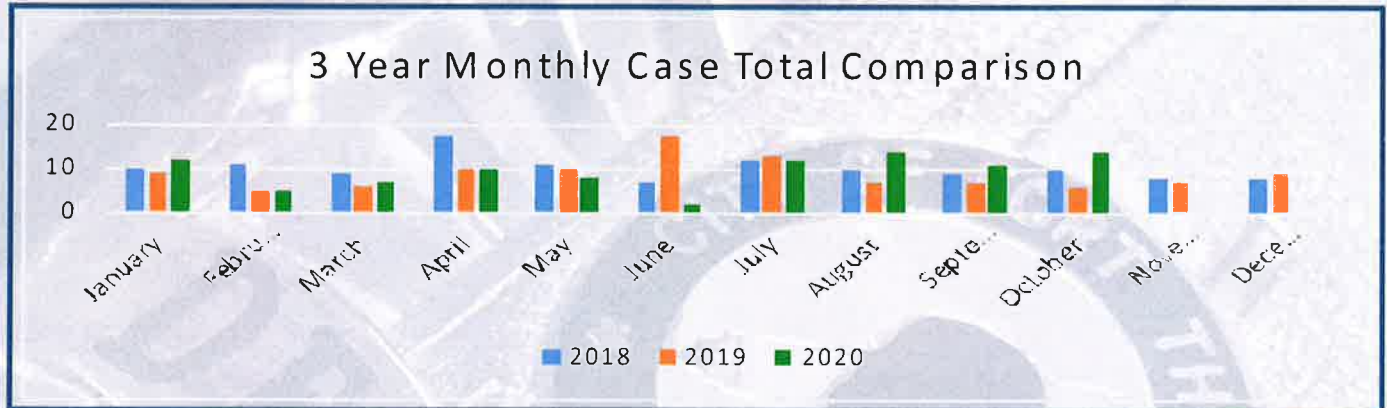

No government agency will ever ask you to send Google Play, Green-Dot gift cards or any other form of gift card type payment.

Never send large amounts of cash.

Monitor your credit through Experian, TransUnion, or Equifax.

If you believe your identity has been stolen, notify credit bureaus and file a complaint through the Kentucky Attorney General's Office, and the Federal Trade Commission.
