April 2021 Monthly Report Summary

COMMUNITY EVENTS:

On Saturday April 24th, the Fort Thomas Police participated in the DEA Drug Take Back Day. Detective Nick Hoffman and Officer Sean Donelan set up and provided drive thru service for the community to drop off old, expired and unused prescription medications. The two collected and turned over to the DEA 12 boxes for destruction, totaling 70,096 grams (**154.5 pounds**) of medications during this event.

The event was once again held in conjunction with the Fort Thomas Lions Club, who collected 6 boxes of unused prescription glasses, which will be refurbished and given to those in need. The event had a new partner, the Campbell County Drug Free Alliance (CCDFA), who through a federal grant, provided complimentary prescription drug lock boxes at the event. The metal boxes have a keyed lock and are capable of being secured out of reach to prevent children or others from having access to potentially dangerous medications. The Department still has a small surplus of these lock boxes available to the public. Please contact Officer Donelan if you are interested.

As a reminder, the Fort Thomas Police Department has a Drug Drop Box available year-round maintained by The Northern Kentucky Drug Strike Force. If you missed the event and would like to drop-off unwanted, expired or unused medication, bring them to the Police Department and an officer will place them in the drop box for you, as the lobby is currently closed during the renovations of the city building. Simply call Campbell County Dispatch at (859) 292-3622 and an officer can meet you at the Police Department to secure them for you.

TRAINING

Sergeant Adam Noe attended ***Active Shooter 360***. Topics covered were from the successful response and investigation into the Madden Tournament mass shooting and the training roadmap it took to get there. During this presentation, Clay County (FL) Sheriff Michelle Cook and Undersheriff Ronald Lendvay discussed various law enforcement areas as they pertain to the crisis readiness and response. The critical areas of discussion included incident command system, media communications, the Victim Assistance Center, partnerships and jurisdiction, the National Compassion Fund, tactical and incident management, the use of Incident Command System, officer advanced medical training, and pitfalls of over-convergence.

Sergeant Derek Faught attended *Finding the Leader in You*. Topics included:

- Overcoming Bureaucracy: The Most Significant Obstacle to Success
- Human Behavior: Knowing and Mastering
- Emotional Intelligence for Employee Motivation
- Leadership, Culture & Today's Environment
- Make Them Want to Follow You
- Drive: What Actually Motivates People?
- The Research & The Stats: What You Need to Know
- What are You Actually Communicating to Your Officers?
- Peter Drucker: Finding Their Talents

Detective Nick Hoffman attended *Stress & Resilience in Law Enforcement*. This course provided insight and information on the topic of wellness and mental health, focusing on stress and resilience in everyday policing. Attendees will understand how stress affects the brain, alters behaviors and feelings, and tools to build resilience. It is imperative that law enforcement officers understand that to take care of others you must take care of yourself first. Wellness and mental health training is not an option, but a requirement to ensure you can sustain a healthy career and personal life.

The department completed the first of its tri-annual firearms training. The first order of the day was to qualify all officers with their pistol. Taser Instructor Officer Matt Marksbury included live fire and hands on application of the taser into the first drill. From there, officers worked on weapon malfunctions and good trigger discipline by incorporating "dummy rounds" or snap-caps into the training. During the last part of the day, the focus was on elevated heart rate shooting by doing functional fitness and movements both singularly and with a partner. Team movement, self-aid with a tourniquet, and one-handed shooting were all used in the remaining drills for the day.

Officer Michael Dietz attended the Indiana SWAT Officers Training Conference. This training brought in instructors, speakers, and company representatives from all over the country. Officer Dietz took two different training classes- The Tactical OODA Loop: Training and Survival and Introduction to Drones. Both classes provided valuable information that can be incorporated back to patrol and the SWAT environment.

ENFORCEMENT:

In April officers wrote 13 speeding charges, 34 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 38 traffic related charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 81 written warnings and totaled 30 court appearances. There were 26 drug related charges placed against 15 adults. Traffic stops were responsible for 25 of the charges.

MISCELLANEOUS:

The Police Department has added two new Officers. Officer Chris Vance, Badge 4456, comes to us with 12 years of experience as an officer. He previously was a Sergeant with Wilder Police and an Officer with Covington Police. Chris and his wife have two children. Officer Jeremy

Moore, Badge 4457, was a Kentucky State Trooper previously, holding positions as a Detective and a Sergeant. Jeremy and his wife are expecting their sixth child this summer. Both Officers bring extensive knowledge to this department, and we are happy to add them to this agency.
